If you are able to Gift Aid your donation please complete your details.



From the Pastors Bookshelf



Nikolaos: A retelling of the Saint Nicholas Story Taylor R Marshall

I am a huge fan off Taylor Marshall's trilogy The Sword and Serpent, The Tenth region of the Night and Storm, Fire and Blood, which are excellent and captivating novels for all ages, following the adventures of Jurian as he travels in the Roman Empire in AD 299. Dr. Marshall, a catholic theologian and blogger, manages to capture the intriguing religious atmosphere of the Roman Empire in the fourth century.

It is in the first book of this trilogy (The Sword and Serpent) that we are introduced to Nikolaos - a presbyter in Myra (modern day Turkey). He is a somewhat mysterious man who appears in the most unlikely and sometimes impossible places. This new book, Nikolaos: A Retelling of the Saint Nicholas Story, is set just before Nikolaos makes his first appearance in the Sword and Serpent. So this book could be regarded as a prequel.

There is a spiritual darkness which is coming over Myra and specifically on one family. Melitta is the oldest of three daughters of Dositheos, a once wealthy merchant who has fallen into difficult times. Melitta has noticed her father has changed, not least since he started to pray to a god he brought in the house. Dositheos is not a christian but Melitta and her sisters are. Nikolaos is confronted with the darkness that is threatening to overwhelm all that is good in Myra. Melitta is at a loss to know how to help her father who is changing into a man she cannot recognise, and on the verge of doing something unthinkable. All her efforts to try and solve the problem only lead to potential disaster. Melitta is a wonderful character that embodies how we often react to the problems we face in life - we try and fix things and when we try and fix things we often face moral dilemmas which can place us into spiritual peril. And yet we reason that if we do this small wrong we can solve the bigger problem.

This is another captivating story from Taylor Marshall. Nikolaos - the small, mysterious presbyter is faced with battling the darkness and trying to help his parishioners Melitta and her sisters as well as their father Dositheos. The 130 pages will fly by as you are drawn into the story. This is another book for all ages - whether you are reading it to your children or just enjoying the story telling of Taylor Marshall - this would make an excellent

Congregational Letter

I have a hunch that one of the things that a lot of Christians will realise when they get to heaven is that they could have lived their lives with far less fear and worry. In other words, I think we will discover that for many of us we played the game of life far too safely. Where we thought we were in danger or in trouble; or when we were too scared to follow the Holy Spirit's leading, or when we thought that money, or a lack of money and resources was a barrier that stopped us from stepping out in faith to do what the Lord was saying to do, we will discover in heaven just how safe and how secure we actually were and that the problems, troubles or dangers we perceived by our natural eyes were in fact irrelevant and insignificant. Indeed, I think in heaven we will sadly realise that compared to incredible riches available to us, we were more concerned with filthy rags and we lived as spiritual paupers.

This is one of the prayers I want to pray this year - Lord, help me not to be a spiritual pauper!

One of the things I am constantly convicted by in my own life is my lack of complete abandonment to the Lord. I want this year to be a year where I / we begin to learn how to abandon myself / ourselves to His ways and His provisions both individually and as a church.

What does utter abandonment to the Lord look like? Read the lives of people like George Whitfield, John Wesley, Charles Spurgeon, William Booth, Corrie Ten Boom, E Stanley Jones, Gladys Aylward, Charles De Foucauld, C T Studd, Rees Howells, Hudson Taylor, Adoniram Judson and many, many others and you will have a wonderful glimpse of it. These men and women lived life without fear and utterly abandoned to the will of God. Their lives were not easy; some had tremendous challenges - but they trusted God with every ounce of their being. They lived loving God and not fearing the world.

Of course the Apostle Paul was one of those whose whole life was lived from the place of utter abandonment to the Lord. His Epistles encouraged the believers to live life in utter abandonment for Jesus.


The reason Paul calls people to utter abandonment to Christ is that Paul KNEW a very important truth. He knew that what was available to us IN Christ, far outstripped the greatest wealth this world could offer us. This is what he exhorts in his letter to the Ephesians. He is exhorting the Ephesian Christians not to miss out on the heavenly treasures that are available to all believers in Christ. Heavenly treasures more precious than anything found in this world.

The tragedy is that too often we accept the world's lie that true treasures are found here and therefore we need to work hard HERE to receive them. This attitude makes us spiritual paupers. May we reject the world's lie. May we realise the world has absolutely nothing of value to offer us. May we this year grasp hold of the great treasures which God has already given us.
