Congregational Letter

New Beginnings

September is traditionally a time for new beginnings. It's the time in the UK when children and young people start September to mid-December at college or school. It's a time for moving up into a new year group. Even if our formal education is long behind us, this is the time when we have finished the summer and we are beginning our regular schedules again – Home groups start up, coffee mornings begin and a whole host of interesting and exciting opportunities begin again. It's new pencils, new shoes and new notebooks time of year.

And with all this newness there sometimes comes a slightly worried, slightly sinking feeling. New expectations. "Am I going to do well this year?" "Will I cope with new responsibilities?" "Will the new people I meet be nice to me?"

Joshua, the man closest to Moses, had to face a whole load of new things when, as Moses drew near to death, he was appointed leader of Israel by God. He was appointed to be the man to lead the nation into the Promised land. (Now aren't you glad you are only going back to a new classroom!)

Interestingly, when Joshua is given his new job, Moses starts by reminding him that the job is already being done by God, who will go ahead of Joshua. Joshua needs to be "Strong and brave". He, along with the people of Israel, must remember the promise God gave to their ancestors, that He would give them the Promised Land. Joshua is assured that "The Lord himself will go ahead of you. He will be with you. He will never leave you. He'll never desert you. So don't be afraid. Don't lose hope". (Deuteronomy 31: 8). Joshua accepts his new commission and even when Joshua worries that the people might not listen to him and follow his commands, provision has already been made for that circumstance.

After the death of Moses, the Lord reminds Joshua again of exactly what He said previously through Moses. He reminds Joshua that He will be with him as He was with Moses and again, He says: "I will never leave you. I will never desert you" (Jos 1:3) and He gives a reminder this time to obey the law that Moses had given to him. He tells him to not stop reading the law and to think about it both day and night and then make sure that he does everything written in it. With this in mind, the Lord promises that things will go well for him, and he will have great success.

Again, God commands Joshua: "Be strong and brave. Do not be terrified. Do not lose hope. I am the Lord your God. I will be with you everywhere you go." (Jos.1:9)

And then just in case Joshua still hasn't understood what God has said, the day before Joshua has to take action, in a quiet moment while Joshua stands before the walls of Jericho, the Angel of the Lord or commander of the Lord's army (most probably Jesus) reminds Joshua that it is the Lord who goes before him and is in charge of the work that He's given Joshua to do.

And on this day, there is a whole new beginning for the people of Israel. From this day onward they are no longer going to be a nomadic people, they are no longer going to dwell in tents and the Manna that has been provided by God is no longer going to appear because the people are going to eat the food that has been grown on the land where they are going to live. Finally, they will have their own space, their own address, their own rose bushes and probably they are a little apprehensive as well as Joshua.

So, in the new things we are facing what can we expect from God? We can expect that God is the same yesterday, today and forever. As Jesus said Matthew 28 v 20: "and you can be sure that I am always with you, to the very end."

So, when you go into the new classroom, new activity or that new office, remember the Lord has gone before you and has prepared the way for you. Remember to be brave and strong. Do not be terrified, do not lose hope. The Lord is with you everywhere you go. Remember that He's giving you His promise in the same way He did for Christians who have gone before you. Remember that the way to success is reading and thinking about God's word and seeking to obey His commands. And if, in a moment of panic in you forget these things, don't worry, Jesus will remind you all over again!



From the Pastor's Bookshelf

Spurgeon: A Life by Alex DiPrima

This is a new, one volume, biography of Charles Spurgeon which was released in August of this year. The last one volume biography of Spurgeon was published in 1985 by Arnold Dallimore. To be able to fit the life of The Prince of Preachers into one manageable volume without leaving huge gaps is a feat, and DiPrima manages to do it very well.



By the time Spurgeon took charge of the famous New Park Street Chapel (later to become Metropolitan Tabernacle) at the age of 19 years old in 1854 Spurgeon had already preached 600 sermons since his conversion 3 years previously.

He arrived at New Park Street when its membership was 252; at the time of his death in 1892, the Metropolitan Tabernacle was 5,311 people with over 14,461 members who had come and moved on in the course of his ministry. When Spurgeon died 20% of all Baptist Ministers had been trained by Spurgeon's Pastors' College.

When you talk about 'Baptists' Charles Spurgeon is perhaps the most famous. But how much do Baptists know about this remarkable man.

This is an excellent and enjoyable book and one which I think all Baptists should read. It covers Spurgeon's life well, highlighting the ups and downs of an amazing ministry. Specifically, this biography gives an excellent account of the Down-Grade Controversy which Spurgeon's wife Susie said shortened his life. It shows us that for decades of his life Spurgeon ministered while in great physical pain due to gout and Bright's disease which affects the kidneys.

Spurgeon's ministry is perhaps unrivalled even in today's world of the mega church. Indeed – Spurgeon's Tabernacle was the largest protestant congregation in the world at its peak – Spurgeon was a mega church pastor before the mega church was invented. Highly recommended.


