STUDY EXODUS – DEUTERONOMY FOUNDATIONS OF GOD'S COVENANT COMMUNITY



These books may not be very familiar to us, Exodus through to Deuteronomy provide the basis for understanding the people of God in the Old Testament and are key not only to the Old Testament but also to many of the discussions and images in the New Testament. If we truly want to understand the background to Jesus and his discussions with the Jewish people of his day, these books are essential reading.

All you need for this course is the Bible. You will receive the course materials which you will go through at home. There will be a fortnightly tutorial where we will discuss what you have been studying. The Cost is $\pounds 60$ (if you would like to do the course but the cost in prohibitive, please let me know.)

Congregational Letter

Success is a dangerous thing. We all want to be successful. We all hate the idea of failure. But there are three elements which are vital for us if we are to truly understand what real success is: 1. Being successful requires that we know how to handle failure 2. Failure helps us to be successful 3. God is the source of all our success – not us!

The big danger with being successful is that it easily breeds self-reliance and self-reliance leads to failure. Success can too easily make us run AHEAD of God instead of walking WITH God. A great example of this is in 2 Samuel 6. In chapter 5 we are told David wins EVERY battle against the Philistines. He is extremely successful. And his success is built on asking God what he should do in each battle.

But in chapter 6, David decides to go and get the Ark of the Covenant and take it to Jerusalem. He made a great show of this -30,000 men go with him. David puts the Ark on a brand-new cart, there is dancing and celebration. The great, successful King David is bringing the Ark to Jerusalem.

But then failure strikes. The oxen stumbles and Uzzah reaches out to steady the Ark and he touches it – forbidden by God – and he dies.

V8 of Chapter 6 says David was angry because of what happened. He was possibly angry that he had realized he had left out one vital ingredient to bringing the Ark to Jerusalem. He did not ask God. He had run AHEAD of God. Out of his success, David forgot to see if what he was doing was right, or whether he was doing it the way God wanted.

It took three months for David to get over this and while the Bible does not tell us explicitly that David asked God how to bring the Ark to Jerusalem, implicitly it is clear he did because when David does go back to collect the Ark, he follows the Lord's instructions as given in Exodus and Leviticus on how to transport the Ark. Not on a new cart – which is how the pagan unbelieving Philistines has transported the Ark - but with Levite priests carrying it on poles as instructed by God. And David sacrificed animals in praise and worship on the way.

The greatest danger to success is that we can too easily fall into the idea that WE are responsible; I built this programme up; I made this event happen; Look at how many come to this or that programme; look how good I AM.

All of which is a recipe for disaster.

When we think success is because of us, we start to think that we should be congratulated. And when we don't receive sufficient recognition then we become upset or even resentful and angry.

We must never let our success mean we run ahead of God – we must always remember that God is the author of our successes, and we must realise that true success is how we deal with failure. And of course, ultimately, it's not our success that really matters – all that matters is the Lord and His glory. The privilege of serving Him is all the success and recognition that we should need.

The Ultimate Exodus: Finding Freedom from What Enslaves You

Night stop By Andy Briers

Michelle and I have been Nightstop hosts for over 10 years hosting young people (aged 17 to 25) who through no fault of their own find themselves homeless. We provide emergency accommodation which consists of a meal, a shower, a bed and someone to talk to. The young people have a rich and varied background and have many encounters and experiences that have shaped their young lives. For some London is not their home and English is not their first language. Some have arrived in the UK after enduring harrowing experiences, others have witnessed the trauma of domestic abuse in the home. But one thing that is true of them all is that they are vulnerable and many just seek a bed and a meal for the night.

We have spent many evenings as a family talking with our guests over a meal or watching football together on the television. Our boys have grown up with these guests in the house and have grown to appreciate and understand that life is not always fair and certainly not equal. It has helped form their characters and provided them with a sense of justice and appreciation of life and has had an influence on their careers and outlook on life.

Many of the young people choose to share their story of homelessness and their fears as well as aspirations as they journey through life. What is true of them all is that it is not their fault that they find themselves in this vicious cycle of homelessness. They tell us about the hopelessness of sleeping rough and how they develop strategies to keep safe on the streets and survive. Many of them resort to riding the bus networks from one side of the Capital to the other. They rely on 24-hour food outlets to keep them warm and in the public eye where they hope there will be less chance of being victimised.

The Homeless Myth

They explain that they are regularly labelled when it comes to homelessness. The same label I used to apply to homeless young people- "you choose the lifestyle, you are unkempt, you are dirty, you don't have a job, you spend all day begging or stealing, you harass others, you are anything but a victim".

The reverse is true - these young people have jobs; attend college and university, they have aspirations and dreams to succeed. They are polite and so very grateful for the support and generosity; they are often embarrassed because they know they cannot repay you and feel inadequate and often ashamed to reach out for help. They find themselves homeless because of circumstances beyond their control - a death in the family, a violent partner, losing their job, the cost of living to name but a few. Life as we know isn't always fair and the young people have found this out the hard way through no fault of their own. They share the same fears as every other young person of fitting in, making friends, only this is exacerbated by worry of where they are going to sleep, can they afford to eat, where will they do their washing, will they be assaulted or attacked? How will they get to college and what will be the stigma attached to them if anyone finds out?

Teachers and authority figures are often unaware of the circumstances these young people endure, because they do their best to hide it - they wash and try to keep themselves and their clothes clean, the last thing they want is to admit they are homeless and need help.

We have met so many amazing young people who are trying to make their way through life. Their stories are complicated, often messy, intertwined with issues of low self-esteem, mental health, and trauma. But despite all of this so many of them display such resilience and hope that things will get better. Every young person has a story- every young person has a journey and we feel that as a family we should do what we can to listen to and play an active part to getting them back on their feet.


